9 Trends That Will Shape Work in 2024 and Beyond

"In 2023, organizations continued to face significant challenges, from inflation to geopolitical turmoil to controversy over DEI and return-to-work policies — and 2024 promises more disruption. Gartner researchers have identified nine key trends, from new and creative employee benefits to the collapse of traditional career paths, that will impact work this year. Benefits of Regional Training

For many local governments, finding affordable, accessible training is a persistent challenge. TxLTAP’s regional training sessions offer a practical solution by delivering hands-on learning in areas like Work Zone Safety, Workforce Development, and other critical topics. These programs have already helped cities and counties across Texas address their specific training needs while significantly reducing costs and travel. Regional training also promotes continuity in performance, ensuring local teams have the knowledge and skills needed to consistently deliver high-quality results on projects. The sessions are tailored to region-specific challenges, fostering collaboration and aligning best practices to enhance efficiency, safety, and long-term success. By investing in regional training, local governments can ensure their workforce is skilled and prepared to tackle the unique challenges facing their communities.

Accessibility

Local governments, especially those in smaller or remote communities, often face significant barriers in accessing essential training for public works employees. Traditional training programs can be costly, with high expenses not only for the courses themselves but also for travel and accommodations, which further strain local budgets. Moreover, long-distance travel and time away from regular duties can disrupt daily operations, making it difficult for employees to attend necessary training. For many, finding training programs that are both affordable and accessible remains a constant challenge.

Collaboration

Regional training creates valuable opportunities for cities and counties to come together and collaborate. By participating, public works professionals can connect with peers facing similar challenges, fostering a sense of community and shared interests. This collaboration allows regions to discuss and analyze local issues, whether they involve practical challenges in roadway and work zone safety, training gaps, or broader operational concerns. Additionally, regional training facilitates dialogue and stronger connections between neighboring municipalities. Ultimately, it not only equips individuals with essential skills but also strengthens the network of public works professionals, benefiting their communities as a whole.

TxLTAP’s First Steps in Regional Training

TxLTAP took its first major steps into regional training in early 2023 by partnering with the City of Fort Worth to address post-Covid training needs in its Public Works Division. Recognizing the value of collaboration, Fort Worth invited surrounding cities and counties to participate, maximizing the reach of LTAP/CCT grant-funded courses. This initiative, now known as the Fort Worth Regional Training Center, became a model for successful

multiorganizational training programs. By pooling resources and expertise, the program provided consistent, high-quality training across the region and fostered collaboration among municipalities. The response was overwhelming, with the first CCT300 Flagger courses filling all 50 seats within two days, drawing participants from seven different cities across two counties. This success highlights the power of regional training in expanding access to professional development for cities and counties.

Expansion Through Webcast Trainings

Building on the success of in-person regional training, TxLTAP has recently introduced webcast training to further expand its outreach and accessibility. In September 2024, TxLTAP held its first Virtual Regional Training, focused on LTPEX: Excavation Safety. This virtual session included participation from not only Fort Worth but also surrounding areas such as Denton County, the City of Justin, and the City of Burleson. By offering virtual training options, TxLTAP continues to meet the training needs of diverse regions, ensuring that communities across Texas can access critical professional development. This innovative approach strengthens regional collaboration and ensures that public works professionals remain well-equipped, regardless of geographic limitations.

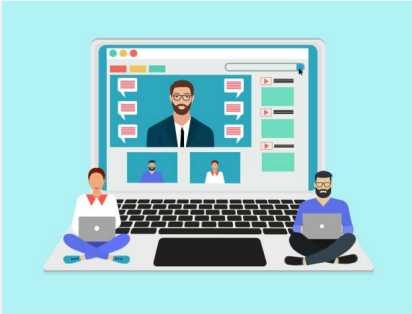
